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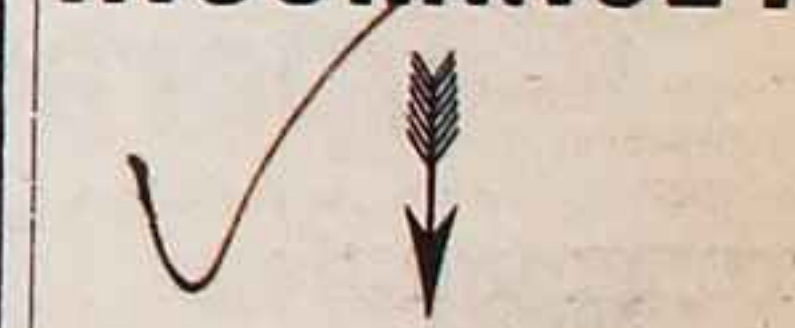

SHALL WE KILL THE GOOSE?

One of the nation's leading lawmakers in a recent radio address made a rather astounding statement which indicated that he has a facility for overlooking fundamentals.

This lawmaker, advocating the passage of a bill he sponsored, said if it increased costs of production the thing to do would be just to take the increased costs out of profits. That is what is called specious reasoning—it looks all right, but that is all.

Look at it this way. Abraham Lincoln once said: "The prudent, penniless beginner in the world labors for wages for awhile, saves

a surplus with which to buy tools or land for himself, then labors for himself another while and at length hires another new beginner to help him. That is the just, and generous and prosperous system, which opens the way to all, gives hope to all, and consequent energy and progress and improvement of condition to all."

What Lincoln said of an individual is, in slightly different fashion, true of the corporation. The corporation is financed by money furnished by investors. If the corporation makes more than it needs it distributes that money to its investors who either spend it, and thus provide jobs for the persons who make the things they buy, or reinvest it, and thus provide more jobs in the same or another corporation.

Now what happens if the beginner Lincoln talked about is unable to earn a surplus? He remains forever unable to hire another beginner. The same is true of a corporation.

Government is necessary. It costs money. That money can be obtained only by taxes. The taxes can come out of the surpluses only of individuals or corporations. If we take all the surpluses in taxes if we do away with profits, we naturally dry up the source of government income, kill the goose that lays the golden egg, and threaten the stability of government.

"Goody" Cole May Have Tablet Erected In Her Memory, Here

At a special meeting of the Society in Hampton Beach for the Apprehension of Those Falsely Accusing Eunice Cole of Having Familiarity With the Devil, yesterday afternoon, it was voted to have a sample of the water from her reputed well, "The Witches Well", sent to Dr. Charles Howard of the New Hampshire state Board of Health for analysis. "The Witch's Well" is one of the points of interest that summer visitors walk out to see that strange spring of water at the reputed home of Eunice ("Goody") Cole out on Island Path. The legend has come down that back in the 1650's Eunice Cole lived out on the Island Path where the least objectionable form of her bewitching things was that she practiced on the water of her well, for this, it averred, when in the sailor's water butt, never grew brackish, no matter how long the voyage. So many boats, other than those of Hampton came into this harbor and sailed up the river, sending their small boats ashore to fill up their butts at Goody Cole's well. Goody Cole came into the focus of public attention in 1656, ten years after the first execution in Boston for witchcraft and 36 years before the outbreak of the great Salem Witchcraft delusion. The society with the long name are accumulating facts with regard to the so-called witch and will probably have a marker put up to inform the public where she was said to have lived up to the time of her trial and conviction for witchcraft.

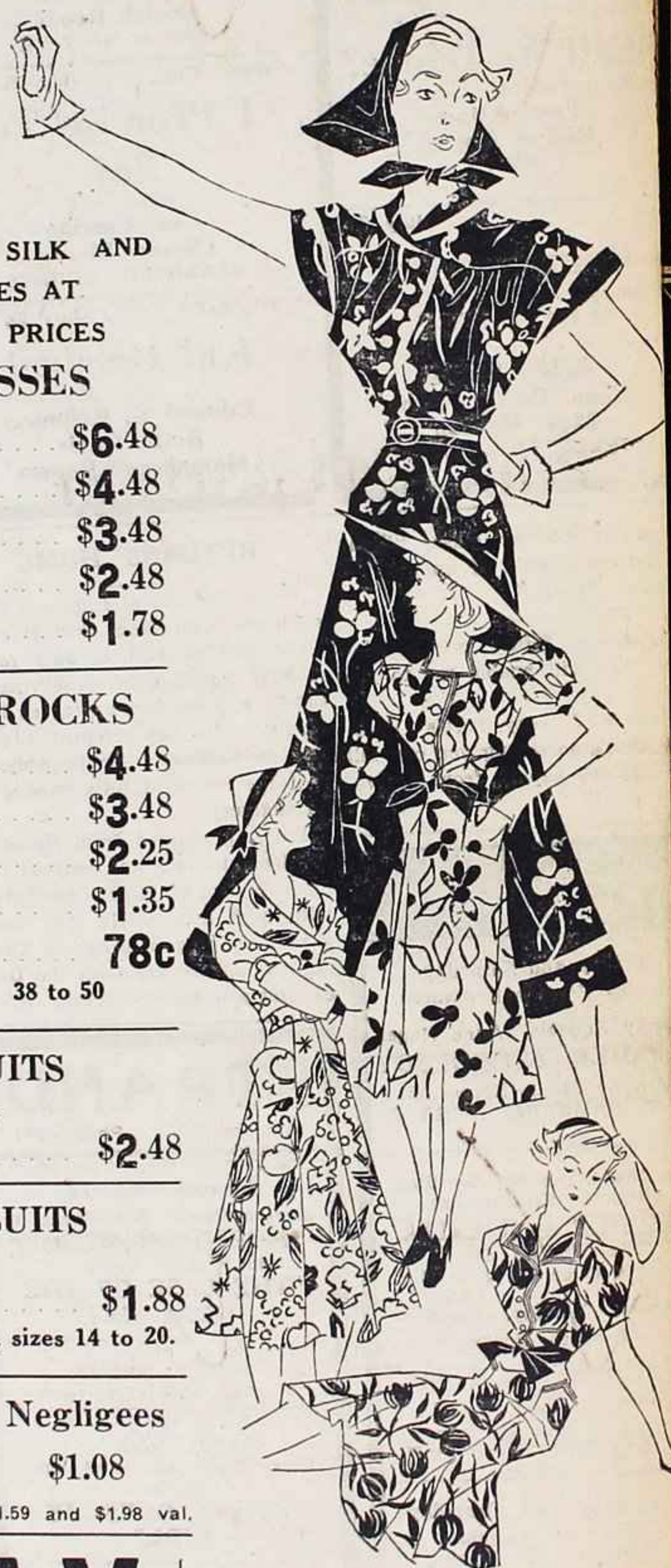
