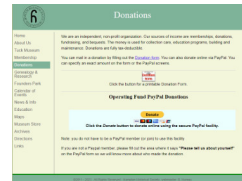
Please renew your membership and consider adding a donation as well. Your generosity will be put to good use and is very much appreciated.

Use the Donation Options on the HHS Website



To make a **Donation** on the HHS website, click the Donations option on the left section of the main page. You can print a donation form and mail it to HHS with your check. Or, you can click the Donate button to donate online using the secure PayPal facility (same PayPal note as above).

Make a Qualified Charitable Distribution from your IRA Account

IRS rules mandate that individuals 73 and older take a required minimum distribution (RMD) from their IRA each year. These annual withdrawals are subject to ordinary income taxes. However, the qualified charitable distribution (QCD) provision allows retirees to donate up to \$100,000 to charity tax free from their IRA each year. The distribution is not included in your income, so you avoid the potential negative consequences that regular IRA withdrawals in retirement can create. A qualified charitable distribution to HHS from your IRA account may be attractive if you don't need all the income from your IRA to meet current living expenses. By donating money to HHS you can enjoy the satisfaction of knowing that you are contributing to a worthy cause while effectively lowering your tax bill.

New Exhibit: Hampton Through the Prohibition Era

Did you know that in June of 1843 a major Temperance celebration was held at Boars Head, Hampton Beach? Years later, the Women's Christian Temperance Union (WCTU) was formed and active in Hampton through the Prohibition Era.



State Prohibition started in 1902, but in accordance with the times, many hotels and restaurant at the beach were granted private licenses. In 1905, the town took back those licenses by a vote. In 1906, the town then realized that in order to bring in tourist money they had to resort to those liquor licenses, giving way to the almighty dollar.

Prohibition became Federal Law under the 18th Amendment in 1920, but NH was two years ahead. The first case under NH law was in 1918 when a contractor working on a highway brought in a keg of beer from Massachusetts for his workers. By 1925, the Coast Guard was very active trying to chase off boats coming up Hampton River, famous for the proverbial Rum Runners!

We learn what it was like for the small group of people who started our Historical Society, then called Meeting House Green Association, during these times!

First 100th Anniversary Event – the First showing of the Documentary Video

A group of eighty people came out on a rainy Saturday afternoon to view the documentary video *History of the Hampton Historical Society* at the Roland Paige Hall in the American Legion building.



The video launches the year long celebration of the 100th Anniversary of the Hampton Historical Society, telling the stories of the founder Reverend Ira S. Jones, benefactor Edward Tuck, Founder's Park, the museum campus, favorite items in the collection, and a look to the future and beyond.

HHS president Lori Cotter introduced the videographers, Mike Garland and Josh Silveira, with the producer Karen Raynes, mentioning that there are many others acknowledged in the credits of the video who helped with the production.



For the event, Hannaford donated a cake and Susie's Sweets donated ice cream, which were served by three museum interns – Jack, Eve, and Isabella – dressed for the task at hand.

As the video states: "This is a story of many dedicated, devoted and determined people. All ready, willing and able to rally to the effort, making the history of Hampton become and remain alive."

Building Community—Twenty Influential Women of Hampton, NH by Karen Raynes and Mary Ann Nelligan is now published and available for purchase.

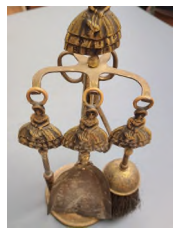
Signed copies of the book may be picked up at the Tuck Museum. There is an exhibit about the Twenty Women in the same room as the Prohibition exhibit.

HHS Centennial Fund - Help Support HHS in its Centennial Year

In this, the 100th anniversary year of the Tuck Museum and the Hampton Historical Society, consider making a gift that will help ensure that HHS lasts another 100 years by making a donation to the HHS Centennial Fund.

The HHS Centennial Fund has been set up in the New Hampshire Charitable Foundation by Betty and Ben Moore and seeded with their most generous contribution. Annual distributions range from 3.5% to 4.5% of the fund value, which means that the HHS Centennial Fund will provide approximately \$3,500 to \$4,500 to HHS every year.

2. Write a check and mail it directly to the NH Charitable Foundation. The check must be made payable to "New Hampshire Charitable Foundation" with the name "HHS Centennial Fund" in the memo field. Mail the check to: NH Charitable Foundation, 37 Pleasant Street, Concord, NH 03301-4005.

Important Note: Do not make the check payable to the Hampton Historical Society and mail it to HHS. HHS cannot accept your check and add it to the Fund, as the society is prohibited from doing that. Only individuals may add to the Fund, and they must contribute directly to the NH Charitable Foundation.

The Hampton Historical Society is enormously grateful to its members for their ongoing generosity, and to Betty and Ben Moore for endowing the HHS Centennial Fund.

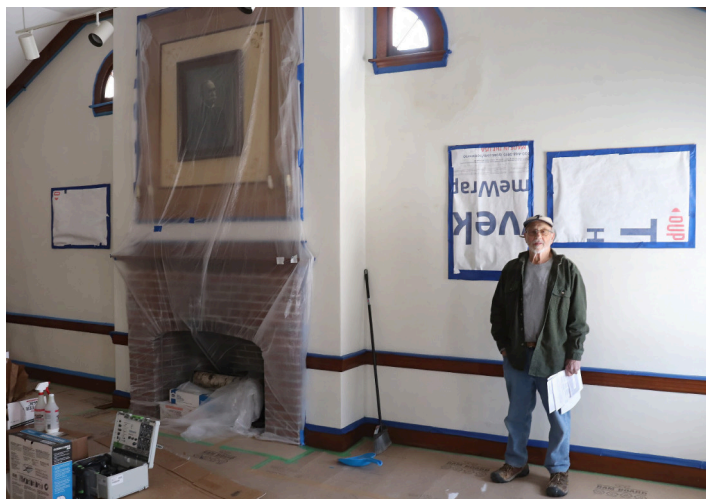

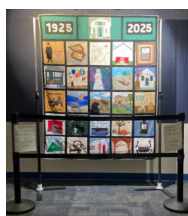
Greetings from the Programs Committee

As we celebrate the 100th Anniversary of the Hampton Historical Society, the Community Engagement and Programs Committee is all in on that! With all the wonderful events planned this year to commemorate this milestone, the Committee is supporting all the events and helping out where we can.



The Committee began their contribution to the celebration last June when we formed a Quilt Group. The group of talented and dedicated volunteers created a commemorative quilt that displays the museum buildings, some of the most iconic items in the museum's collection, and annual events. Each quilter chose the subject for their quilt square and portrayed it using their own selection of perspective, material, and colors.

The result is a beautiful array of the sites in and around the museum buildings and grounds. The quilt has been displayed at the Recreation Center and the Lane Library and is currently at Marston School for use as a teaching tool for the students as they prepare for their visit to Tuck Museum in May. Following its stay at Marston, the quilt will be on display at the town hall. Stay tuned to see where the quilt goes from there!
